From the Principal . . .

"I was a stranger and you welcomed me" (Mt 25:36). This week is Refugee Week and tomorrow, 20 June, marks the World Day of Migrants and Refugees. This is an opportunity to give thanks for the many different cultures that make up our Australian community. In our own school; staff, students and their families come from over fifty different cultural and ethnic groups. We are indeed a richer and luckier school community because of this.

Too often when we think about migration, refugees, international students and asylum seekers we think about the cost; the burden; about what we're called to give or give up. However, we forget about what migrants and refugees bring to our communities. We forget that at some time most of us, or our families, have also come from somewhere else. Migrants and refugees do not come empty handed. They come to us with an abundance of gifts, experiences and wisdom. Imagine our country without the rich influences of people who have come here from all parts of the world.

World Day for Refugees and Migrants is also a chance for each of us to reflect on how well we welcome strangers into our community, how much of a fair go we give them and what we do to assist them to participate fully in Australian life.

In his message for the 101st World Day for Migrants and Refugees, Pope Francis urges us to be a *Church without frontiers*, to stand in solidarity with migrants and refugees and to help create a culture of acceptance where no one is seen as useless, out of place or disposable.

"Large numbers of people are leaving their homelands, with a

suitcase full of fears and desires to undertake a hopeful and dangerous trip in search of more human living conditions. Often, however, such migration gives rise to suspicion and hostility, even in ecclesial communities, prior to any knowledge of the migrant's lives or their stories of persecution and destitution. In such cases, suspicion and prejudice conflict with the biblical commandment of welcoming with respect and solidarity, the stranger in need" (Pope Francis, 2015)

This year marks the 40th anniversary of Vietnamese settlement in Australia. With this newsletter we have included an article from Kairos where Bishop Vincent Long OFM Conv describes the celebrations to mark this milestone, and reflects on the contributions that the Vietnamese community has made to both Australia and the Church.

YEAR 8 OVERNIGHT CAMP TO MELBOURNE

As part of the Peg8sus program (Personal and Social Learning) all Year 8 students will be attending an overnight camp to Melbourne. This camp is a very important part of your child's development and growing need for independence and travelling around Melbourne is central to the experience. It provides opportunity to build friendships, skills in safety and responsibility, participation in group challenges in the city of Melbourne and also requires your child to meet several tasks for English and Humanities subjects.



The dates for this camp are as follows:

Tuesday—Wednesday 21st and 22nd July 8 Attard and 8 Orifici Wednesday—Thursday 22nd and 23rd July 8 Edison Thursday—Friday 23rd and 24th July 8 Hollows and 8 Clark

During the Melbourne City experience, students will participate in exploration of the City via a Scavenger Hunt and dining experiences, English film work, Humanities questionnaire and city living. Skills will also include public speaking and forming new friendship groups and students are encouraged to appreciate the city environment with all of their senses.

It is necessary for each student to have their own myki card for this important part of their learning, enabling them to move about the city on both days. Each card needs to be topped up before the first day of travel. A new (child under 16) student card will cost \$3 and travel for the two days will cost \$8, a total of \$11 for travel during the camp.

Students need to be at school at 8.30am and will return the following day at 3.05pm.
This is an overnight camp.

(CSEF)

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund will ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities.

School **camps** provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, **excursions** encourage a deeper understanding of how

the world works and **sports** teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. The allowance will be paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions, or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student will be:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students.



On the first weekend in May, Vietnamese Catholics across Melbourne gathered in big numbers at the Catholic Centre in Keysborough to celebrate the Second Congress of Our Lady of Lavang.

Under a clear sky and unusually warm autumn sunshine, a sea of people in their traditional costumes and uniforms processed in honour of their beloved Our Lady of Lavang, whose statue was appropriately carried by a boat. This year marks the 40th anniversary of the Fall of Saigon and the subsequent exodus of Vietnamese boat people.

According to the 2011 Census, there are 233,387 people of Vietnamese ancestry living in Australia. Of these, 85,191 live in Victoria, mostly in Melbourne. The Vietnamese Catholic community in Melbourne has more than 23,000 members and 15 Mass centres, making it the largest and the best organised group in Australia.

Following the success of the first congress in October 2013, the community decided to celebrate the milestone of their settlement with a bigger and better event. With a combined attendance of over 7000 people, the congress exceeded all expectations. The overwhelming sense of pride, joy and harmony and the spirit of dedication and service that characterised the event were remarkable.

Every church-based group in the community was represented: Cursillos, Secular Franciscans, Secular Dominicans, Legion of Mary, Eucharistic Youth, World Youth Day Youth, Marriage Encounter, Catholic Mothers, Divine Mercy and so on. Over 200 volunteers worked around the clock to ensure the safety and wellbeing of all participants.

The theme of the congress was 'With Our Lady of Lavang, we journey with our Vietnamese people'. Participants were treated to a rich program of spiritual, historical and cultural significance. The evening concert, for example, recounted the many stories of Vietnamese people who lived during the tumultuous period between the 1950s and 1970s. Beginning with the partition of the two Vietnams, going through the longest civil war in history and then ending with the communist takeover of the south and the tragic exodus of boat people, the concert brought to life the many tales of suffering, resilience and hope.

In all these trials and tribulations, Vietnamese Catholics are reminded that Mary accompanied them on their journey of life and faith, just as she did her battered children in the time of the imperial persecution in Vietnam.

Bishop Michael Hoang Duc Oanh, from the Diocese of Kontum in central Vietnam, was the guest speaker. Bishops Hilton Deakin, Peter Elliott, Terry Curtin and Mark Edwards OMI were also in attendance.


Mgr Greg Bennet spoke on behalf of Archbishop Denis Hart. He paid tribute to those who left everything in pursuit of freedom and dignity, including the thousands who perished on the seas, in the refugee camps and along the way.

'Today we thank you for the witness of your faith and your extraordinary ability to rise above adversity to grasp the promise that God held out to you. You were prepared to leave all behind in order to seek a new life in a new land. Your faith was strong—your devotion to Our Lady, simple prayers whispered seeking God's shepherding love, were your talismen for the journey,' Mgr Bennet said.

He spoke of the Vietnamese Catholics as the providentially renewing force for the Church in Australia. They enrich the Archdiocese of Melbourne with their vibrant faith, their religious brothers and sisters, priests and even their own bishop!

'There is something powerful about the gift of Vietnamese families who to this day are proud to allow their children to

serve God and the Church with their joyful, faithful and dedicated lives,' Mgr Bennet said.

The congress was the joint effort of the community, rich with spiritual reflections, catecheses, processions, floral presentations and other activities. It was an expression of the community's desire to give witness to their faith and to nurture it in a new Australian environment.

In my concluding homily, I gave thanks to God for his providential care. Notwithstanding the tragic exodus, Vietnamese Catholics today have come of age and become God's unlikely instruments. It is their mission to renew the Church in Australia and to act as catalysts for a new dawn of hope in their native land.

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Year 9 Program

The first half of the year has been a very busy one for our year 9 students.

The journey so far...

In Term 1 of the Yr 9 Trinity Program, the students focussed on The Self. Through a series of written and hands on activities and guest speakers, students developed a greater independence and an understanding about the importance of good nutrition for their physical and mental well being. Students also learned about what it means to be a man and woman in today's society; the implications of our behaviour on our future, our families and our community; the effects of negative self-talk and the importance of a positive self-image. They researched the symptoms and effects of stress; how it impacts on society and investigated a variety of stress management techniques.

In Term 2, the students focussed on their Future. They explored what it means to be an adult; the roles and responsibilities; the employment market and the world of work. Through various classroom activities and a number of guest speakers, students began exploring and preparing for their own future pathways and employment options. The students have been guided through the process of applying for jobs, which included the writing of a job application and resume and sitting a mock interview. They are currently undertaking Drug Education and have recently completed First Aid training and a visit to CRC Sydenham on Friday 12th June for VET Taster day.

Still to come...

In Term 3 of the Yr 9 Trinity Program, the students will focus on Community involvement. Through a series of written and hands on activities, students will develop an understanding of voluntary work and develop the skills required when working with a variety of people within our community. Students will also undertake a project with a particular community not-for-profit agency and learn about the value and importance of individual contribution of time and money to assist in our community. They will also take part in the inter-school sports Premier League Program.

Semester two permission forms for all activities related to the Trinity Program and Premier League will be distributed soon to students and will need to be signed and returned by your child to their Pastoral Care teacher before the end of term.

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Dear Parents and Carers,

The Australian government requires all schools to inform them of the number of students with a disability enrolled at their school and how those students are supported. CRC is currently collecting this data. This information helps the government to make decisions about funding across a variety of programs. CRC would like to ensure parents that the confidentiality of students will be protected throughout this process. The data collection requires numbers only, no names are used. Please read the following fact sheet carefully as it explains the process in detail. If you have any concerns please feel free to contact the school. The websites referred to within the following fact sheet are also useful sources of information.

2015 information for parents and carers

WHAT IS THE NATIONAL DATA COLLECTION?

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (the national data collection) is an annual collection that counts the number of school students with disability and the level of reasonable educational adjustment they are provided with.

The national data collection will count students who have been identified as receiving an adjustment to address a disability under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* (the DDA). The DDA can be accessed from the ComLaw website at www.comlaw.gov.au.

WHAT IS THE BENEFIT FOR MY CHILD?

The aim of the national data collection is to collect better information about school students with disability in Australia.

This information will help teachers, principals, education authorities and families to better support students with disability to take part in school on the same basis as students without disability.

The national data collection is an opportunity for schools to review their learning and support systems and processes to continually improve education outcomes for their students with disability.

WHY IS THIS DATA BEING COLLECTED?

All schools across Australia collect information about students with disability. But the type of information currently collected varies between each state and territory and across government, Catholic and independent school sectors.

When implementing the national data collection, every school in Australia will use the same method to collect information. Therefore, a government school in suburban Sydney will collect and report data in the same way as a Catholic school in country Victoria and an independent school in the Northern Territory.

The information provided through the national data collection will enable all Australian governments to better target support and resources to benefit students with disability. The data will help schools to better support students with disability so that they have the same opportunities for a high quality education as students without disability.

WHAT ARE SCHOOLS REQUIRED TO DO FOR STUDENTS WITH DISABILITY?

All students are entitled to a quality learning experience at school.

Schools are required to make reasonable adjustments, where needed, to assist students with disability to access and participate in education free from discrimination and on the same basis as other students.

These responsibilities are outlined in the DDA and the Disability Standards for Education 2005 (the Standards). The Standards require educators, students, parents and others (e.g. allied health professionals) to work together so that students with disability can participate in education. The Standards can be accessed via the ComLaw website at www.comlaw.gov.au.

WHAT IS A REASONABLE ADJUSTMENT?

A reasonable adjustment is a measure or action taken to help a



student with disability access and participate in education on the same basis as students without disability. Reasonable adjustments can be made across the whole school setting (e.g. ramps into school buildings), in the classroom (such as adapting class lessons) and at an individual student level (e.g. extra tuition for a student with learning difficulties).

WHAT INFORMATION WILL BE COLLECTED?

Every year your child's school will collect the following information for each student with a disability:

- the student's level of education (i.e. primary or secondary)
- the student's level of adjustment
- the student's broad type of disability.

The information collected by schools will be provided to all governments to inform policy and programme improvement for students with disability.

WHO WILL BE INCLUDED IN THE NATIONAL DATA COLLECTION?

The definition of disability for the national data collection is based on the broad definition under the DDA.

For the purposes of the national data collection, students with learning difficulties such as dyslexia or auditory processing disorder as well as chronic health conditions like epilepsy, diabetes or asthma, that require active monitoring by the school, may be included.

WHO WILL COLLECT INFORMATION FOR THE NATIONAL DATA COLLECTION?

Teachers and school staff will identify the number of students with disability in their school and the level of reasonable adjustment they are provided based on:

- consultation with parents and carers in the course of determining and providing reasonable adjustments
- the school team's observations and professional judgements
- any medical or other professional diagnosis
- other relevant information.

School principals are responsible for ensuring the information identified about each student is accurate.

HOW WILL MY CHILD'S PRIVACY BE PROTECTED?

Protecting the privacy and confidentiality of all students and their families is essential. Personal details such as student names or other identifying information will not be provided to local or federal education authorities.

IS THE NATIONAL DATA COLLECTION COMPULSORY?

All education ministers agreed to full implementation of the national data collection from 2015. This means that all schools must now collect and report information annually on the number of students with disability in their care and the level of adjustment provided to them.

Information about the arrangements that may apply to your school in relation to this data collection is available from your child's school principal and the relevant education authority or association of impendent schools.

Even if your child's information is not included in the national data collection, the school is still required to provide support to your child with education needs.
