Refugee and Migrant Sunday

The World Day of Migrants and Refugees is commemorated in Australia on the last Sunday of August. This year, Pope Francis has chosen the theme, "Child Migrants, the Vulnerable and the Voiceless".

In his message for the 103rd World Migrants and Refugees Day, Pope Francis calls us to:

- care for migrants and refugees, particularly the young
- ensure that no-one is a stranger in the Christian community;

- work towards the protection and safety of child migrants and refugees;
- assist with their integration into our community, and
- get informed and involved in addressing the causes that trigger migration and displacement: war, poverty, corruption and the impact of natural disasters.

Too often when we think about migration, refugees, international students and asylum seekers we think about the cost; the burden; about what we're called to give or give up. However, we forget about what migrants and refugees bring to our communities. We forget that at some time most of us, or our families, have also migrated from somewhere else. Migrants and refugees do not come empty handed. They come to us with an abundance of gifts, experiences and wisdom. Imagine our country without the rich influences of people who have come here from all parts of the world.

Refugee and Migrant Sunday is an opportunity to reflect on how well we welcome strangers into our community, how much of a fair go we give them and what we do to assist them to participate fully in Australian life.

We then reinforced it will two rolls of masking tape so it would be very sturdy. It was a fun experience to create the paper chair. At the end of the competition we won the paper chair competition."



Visiting the Fishes and Loaves Food Bank




On the 18th of August, just like every Friday, three year 8 students volunteer to help out the Fishes and Loaves Food Bank at Holy Eucharist. The food bank helps families who are in need of food and all the people who work there are volunteers. Roughly 200 boxes of food are handed out once a week. Food that is unsold from supermarkets, companies and produce that is grown from CRC's garden is donated to Fishes and Loaves.

Each week volunteers from year 8 help pack the food into crates, sorting out the donated food. Foods such as snacks, produce, grains, canned, drinks, desserts and many more. Some days there are a lot more groceries to sort out and sometimes there is very little, it all depends on the donations coming in. We are not only able to help distribute the food but we get to socialize with the volunteers and experience the good deed of helping people out.

Faith in Action at CRC St Albans




Over the four years at St Albans, students are involved in a wide variety of social justice opportunities. Some of opportunities are imbedded in both the RE curriculum and the personal and social learning units. Others opportunities are extra-curricular such as participation in the Vinnie's group or participation in the CRC St Albans community garden.

The way social justice is responded within the school, is that it starts local and evolves as the students' progress to the senior levels. The Year 7's theme this term is growing in our community. They do this by responding to needs at home and in their classroom. In the RE program the students documents their thoughtful acts and reflect on the impact this has had on their families and their classrooms. In term 4 the Year 7 theme is giving. In this term they will be preparing for Christmas by donating toys and food to St Vinnies so they can create hampers for those in need at Christmas.

In year 8 the students are currently studying in RE the Kingdom of God. After looking at how the first and second testament explore the kingdom of God students develop their own vision of the Kingdom of God and how we can go about creating the Kingdom of God, here on Earth. They actively do this by assisting in both community garden and on Fridays at the Holy Eucharist Food Bank.

In Year 9 next term in RE students will be examining Catholic Social Teaching principles. Two Principles Subsidiarity and Stewardship are demonstrated through the Trinity program students in their classes support local disability services, and assist with local environmental projects.

The Year 10 students are completing `A Call to Justice' unit in RE where they are examine key Church Docuements such as Gaudium et Spes and explore how the Catholic Church should responds to social justice issues around the world. As part as the community service students in small groups visit age care services, and assist students with reading after school and within the classroom.
